Re: Alan Leatherwood, VDOT Resident Administrator Road Matters

Leatherwood: Thank you Mr. Chairman, couple things tonight that is just some information. The Revenue Sharing Program which is coming up, the applications will be taken through next month. Re: Consider Authorization to Draft a Buckingham County Technology Use Policy and Buckingham Technology Manager Use Policy

Mrs. Carter asked that the Board authorize her to work with Jamie Shumaker and the County Attorney to bring back for your consideration a Buckingham County Technology Use Policy and a Buckingham Technology Manager Use Policy. Although we are not to her knowledge experiencing any abuse of our technology system we feel that a policy should be in place to assure that this does not occur and to have a policy to follow should such occur. Buckingham

does have an Information Technology Manager now and I think that we should have such a policy. The auditors concur that this should be implemented.

Supervisor LeSueur moved, Supervisors Talbert and Chambers seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to authorize a committee consisting of Rebecca Carter, Jamie Shumaker and E.M. Wright, Jr. to bring back a Technology Use Policy to the Board.

Re: Consider Authorization to work with the County Attorney to bring the Buckingham County Ordinances into a Buckingham Code Format

Buckingham County has many ordinances on the record, many that are of age and no longer needed or necessary. We would like to place our ordinances on our website for the public to review. Presently we have the Zoning, Subdivision, Building Inspection and Solid Waste Ordinance on the website. Our ordinances are listed by number and name. The number of the ordinance is the order in which the ordinance was adopted instead of the order of topic or issue. I would like the authority to work with the departments involved and the county attorney to go through all of these ordinances to bring back a report to you of any that may need to be rescinded or that is over ridden by the Zoning Ordinance and to work with the County Attorney to develop a uniform ordinance code book that can be more easily listed on the web site to give the public access to all of our rules and regulations and also for the county to have a more uniformed system of regulations. All information would be brought back to you for your final approval.

Supervisor Kitchen moved, Supervisor LeSueur seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to authorize the County Administrator to work with various departments and County Attorney to clean up the ordinances and bring them back to the Board.

Re: Consider Approval of FY2010 Performance Contract between Crossroads and Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services

Mr. Will Rogers, Executive Director of the Crossroads Community Services has presented for your review and approval a 2010 Performance Contract between Crossroads Community Services Board and the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services. This contract was approved by the Crossroads Board of Directors initially on May 26, 2009 and again with final revision on Tuesday June 16, 2009. In order for Crossroads to be eligible to receive state controlled funds for mental health, mental retardation, or substance abuse services the performance contract has to be approved by the governing body. This document is about 100 pages. There does not appear to be any changes in the document that you approved for 2009. If you wish to review this document please advise me and we will provide you a copy.

Please consider approval of this contract pending review and approval of the County Attorney.

Supervisor LeSueur moved, Supervisor Chambers seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to approve this contract pending review and approval of the County Attorney.

Supervisor Kitchen moved, Supervisor LeSueur seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to accept the bid from Fred Jones Well Co. in the amount of \$4,500 for the well at the Animal Control Facility.

Supervisor LeSueur moved, Supervisor Kitchen seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to accept the bid from Talbott Wood Products in the amount of \$3,700 for the septic system at the Animal Control Facility.

Re: Consider Resolution for VDOT to place a sign at intersection of Main Street and US15 for GIGA Park Sign

The county has received a grant of placing a GIGA Park Sign near the Industrial Park indicating that the Industrial Park is connected with fiber optic broadband cabling that can be purchased at a lesser rate. Giga in networking terms means 1000 MB, which is the speed that data is transferred. The Broadband and the Sign have been paid for through the Broadband Initiative Funds through the Tobacco Commission. The State wishes for the sign to be placed closer to the main road so that it will be better advertised. The proposed area will need the permission of Farmers Bank and approval from VDOT.

Tommy Ranson has been advised that in order to get the sign located without VDOT permits and fees a resolution will have to be approved saying the sign will be maintained by the County and some other requirements that I have included in the attached resolution. We are still waiting on approval from Farmers Bank.

WHEREAS, The County of Buckingham now has Broadband access in the Buckingham County Industrial Park area.

WHEREAS, a grant of a sign has been awarded to Buckingham County designating the Buckingham County Industrial Park as a GIGA Park.

WHEREAS, The County of Buckingham is requesting permission from VDOT for the placement of a sign at the intersection of Main Street and US 15 in Dillwyn Virginia;

WHEREAS, the size of the sign will be approximately 4' wide by 6' tall, the sign will not be located on VDOT right of way, the sign is an official government sign, the County of Buckingham is the owner of the sign and the County of Buckingham will maintain the sign.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Buckingham County Board of Supervisors requests approval from VDOT for the placement of said sign.

Supervisor Kitchen moved, Supervisor LeSueur seconded and was unanimously Carried by the Board to approve the Resolution for VDOT to place a sign at the intersection of Rt. 15 and Main Street for GIGA Park Sign.

Talbert: Just a comment. I think we should go with this and change the name to Business Park and drop that industrial park. The supervisors that voted on that did the right thing. But I've noticed that different counties have it as Business Park and things are coming in because they are business. Industry is a different thing. We've got one business in there, Tiger Cat. That's the only one we got. You can vote on that to do that but I think we should look into that, not tonight, but bring it up to the public.

LeSueur: This is not to replace the Industrial Park Sign.

Talbert: I know that, but what I'm saying is I'd like for us to look at doing away from the Industrial Park Sign and make it a business park because I know Prince Edward, look at what they've got there. I'll support this but you know.

Mrs. Carter: It is zoned light industry so we will have to rezone it but we can look into it.

LeSueur: It could be business/industrial park if we can get by with it.

Talbert: If a business wants to do something, they are not going to look at it because it is industrial park.

**Re: Martha Louis, Historic Buckingham Inc.
Cowboy Day**

Mrs. Louis: Thank you for letting us come in and show you something fun tonight. All this business stuff gets boring. We have something fun. Cowboy Day is coming up July 25th, 9 to 6. Does anybody remember Larry Storch from F-Troop in the old days? Larry Storch is coming to town. Lives in New York City, he's still an actor at the age of 86 but he is coming. He's very agile and is bringing a lot of folks to Buckingham. We have a lot planned for the day. We are going to pass out a schedule of events. We have a train ride, rifle history camp, Native American camp, cowboy camp, Pony Express riders, and Circuit riders. I'm going to introduce you to Mitch Toney with Tom Nix Rangers.

Mitch Toney: Hopefully you guys know who the Tom Nix Rangers are by now. I'm Mitch Toney. I ride with them. In 2005 George Bush passed an amendment to make the 4th Saturday in July each year a day honoring the American Cowboys, "Cowboy Day". The first Cowboy day was in Pennsylvania in 2005 and we got some national press, they printed out picture and wrote a little blurb about us in American Cowboy Magazine. I thought, somebody asked me in December what we were doing this year for Cowboy Day. We've got Historic Village here, the train rides we've been robbing for 20 years and I called Martha and we talked about it and she said let's talk to the Chamber and we sat down with the Chamber of Commerce and everybody agreed that this could be something really good and positive to bring some business into the county. Also to get some attention for all the re-inactors we have, from Appomattox we have Civil War re-inactors, Native American powwows all over the state, because of our Native American heritage here. We have a lot of positive things in the County. And we can bring in a lot of business and attention here with what we have to offer in Buckingham. I think it's a shame to have it ignored for years and years and now I think its time to do something about it. So in that Cowboy spirit we contacted Larry Storch. We first had Buck Taylor but he got double booked but he did say he would be here next year. Hopefully we will be doing this again next year. Larry Storch decided to come down. Another actor, if you grew up in the 60s you saw Larry on TV. He was on Get Smart, Gilligan's Island. He was the voice of the original Joker in Batman cartoon series. He also did Tennessee Tuxedo and the Gogo Gofers. A lot of cartoon voices. Peter Boone, son of actor Richard Boone, did movies with John Wayne; he's going to be coming down and bringing down some of his dad's memorabilia. We will have a bunch of authors, local authors coming. Joe Lively from Amelia, Greg Overcash for Baltimore Md. So I also wanted to try to involve as many people in the community as we could. LaRue Sprouse of Sprouse's Corner Ranch, her group is running the Pony Express. I'm going to help them out. The Old Dominion Fast Draw Express is coming out of Lynchburg. We've got Civil War re-

inactors coming from all over, Native American Dancers, CanCan Girls on the train, 4 bands lined up to play. All around fun family day. Hopefully you can bring the kids to and remember the rest of your lives.

Mrs. Louis: He neglected to mention that we hat PBS coming to Buckingham. That's pretty exciting. We are going to be on Virginia Current. That's pretty neat. We are happy with the high school is going to let us use their parking lot because we think we are going to have a pretty big crowd. Mitch is handing out on behalf of Chamber of Commerce and Tom Nix tickets for all Supervisors to get into the Village. All he kids can get in free. This is a great thing for the kids they will have a super time.

Re: Public Hearing Proposed Amendments to the Buckingham Emergency Operation Plan

There is a required change that needs to be made to the county's Emergency Operation Plan. This amendment will become effective July 1, 2009. It is recommended that this be placed in the Emergency Support Function 6 of the EOP which covers law enforcement. The sheriff's office will be in contact with these victims from the onset of the event and they have daily contact with DCJS.

“This is to advise you that Code of Virginia §23-9.2:9 and §44-146.18 were amended and will require state institutions of higher education and local governments to include a provision in their emergency operations plans that the Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services (VDCJS) and the Virginia Criminal Injuries Compensation Fund (VCICF) shall be contacted immediately to deploy assistance in the event of an emergency as defined in the emergency response plan when there are victims as defined in §19.2-11.01, as well as current contact information for both. Local Planning Assistance (LPA) revised the Concept of Operations Section of the Basic Plan Template and the ESF5 Annex of the College and University EOP template and Local EOP template to reflect these amendments. This amendment will become effective July 1, 2009.

As a reminder, VDEM policy directs an institution to channel requests for state resources through the local government's EOC. Therefore, to be consistent with the aforementioned code references and policy:

1. Both the institutions and local government should include notification of VCICF and VDCJS in their plans.
2. Actual notification should be conducted on behalf of the institution when events involve higher education entities by the locality, and
3. The institution involved should have a process in place to verify the action was taken.

Recommended addition to ESF6:

- In instances when there are criminal victims as defined by Code of Virginia §19.2-11.01, the local government must contact the Department of Criminal Justice Services and the Virginia Criminal Injury Compensation Fund immediately to deploy assistance in the event of an emergency.”

Chairman Snoddy declared the Public Hearing open for public comments.

There were no comments.

Chairman Snoddy declared the Public Hearing closed.

Supervisor Kitchen moved, Supervisor LeSueur seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to amend the Local Emergency Operation Plan.

Re: Public Hearing Proposed Amendments to the Buckingham County Law Library Fee to Increase the Law library Fee from \$2.00 to \$4.00 and Implementation of a new fee of \$3.00 on all civil cases, all criminal and all traffic cases to be reserved for the renovation or adaptive use of the old courtroom.

The Code of Virginia §17-1-281 and §42.1-70 allows for the assessment of a Courthouse Maintenance Fee and a Law Library Fee.

Virginia Code §17.1-281: Any County or city, through its governing body, may assess a sum not in excess of two dollars as parts of the cost in (1) each civil action filed in the district or circuit courts located within its boundaries and (2) each criminal or traffic case in its district or circuit court in which the defendant is charged with a violation of any statute or ordinance. The total assessments authorized by the county or city in a civil action pursuant to this section and §42.1-70 shall not exceed four dollars.

Virginia Code §42.1-70: Any county, city or town may through its governing body, assess, as part of the costs incident to each civil action filed in the courts located within its boundaries, as sum not in excess of four dollars.

The County now assesses a \$2.00 Courthouse Maintenance Fee and a \$2.00 Law Library Fee.

House Bill 2311 was signed by the Governor on April 9, 2009 that allows for a new fee of up to \$3.00 for construction, reconstructions, renovation, or adaptive re-use of a courthouse, on all civil cases (\$501.00 or more), all criminal and all traffic cases. House Bill 2311 also amends the Code of Virginia to remove the limit of \$4.00 and the courts will be able to assess a total of \$6.00 (\$2.00 for Courthouse Maintenance and \$4.00 for Law Library Fee) for civil cases. This amendment will be effective July 1, 2009.

This is a public hearing to amend the County Ordinance to increase the Law Library Fee from \$2.00 to \$4.00 and also to implement the new fee of \$3.00 on all civil cases \$501.00 or more, all criminal and all traffic cases. The new \$3.00 fee must be for the construction, reconstruction, renovation, or adaptive re-use of a courthouse. During the Courthouse Renovation Project the County did not do all of desired restorative work to the old Court Room. It would be Mrs. Carter's recommendation that this \$3.00 fee be implemented to be reserved for the restoration of the old court room. This project should qualify as that room is used for various court services.

The adoption of these amendments into the County ordinance will assess the following fees:

1. Courthouse Maintenance Fee: \$2.00 on each civil action filed in the district or circuit courts and each criminal or traffic case in its district or circuit court in which the defendant is charged with a violation of any statute or ordinance (no change)
2. Law Library Fee: \$4.00 as part of the costs incident to each civil action filed in the courts. (change from \$2.00 to \$4.00)
3. New Fee for construction, reconstruction, renovation or adaptive re-use of a courthouse to be assessed in civil matters where the amount in controversy is in excess of \$500.00 and each criminal or traffic case in district or circuit court in which the defendant is charged with a violation of any statute or ordinance: \$3.00.

Chairman Snoddy declared the public hearing for the Law Library Fee open for public comment.

There were no comments.

Chairman Snoddy declared the public hearing closed.

Supervisor Kitchen moved, Supervisor LeSueur seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to approve the amendment to the Law Library Fee from \$2.00 to \$4.00 effectively immediately.

Chairman Snoddy declared the public hearing for the Implementation of a new fee of \$3.00 on all civil cases, all criminal and all traffic cases to be reserved for the renovation or adaptive re use of the old courtroom.

There were no comments.

Chairman Snoddy declared the public hearing closed.

Supervisor Kitchen moved, Supervisor LeSueur seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to approve the Implementation of a new fee of \$3.00 on all civil cases, all criminal and all traffic cases to be reserved for the renovation or adaptive re use of the old courtroom.

Re: Susan Rabold, City Scape Consultants: Comprehensive Cellular Tower Plan

Susan Rabold with City Scape Consultants gave a presentation on the Comprehensive Cellular Tower Plan. A copy of this presentation is attached and hereby becomes a part of these minutes.

Re: Gary Blair, School Superintendent: Budget Changes FY10

Mr. Blair presented some changes for the FY10 Budget that was approved at the July 8, 2009 School Board meeting. The changes reflect changes in the amounts that we are projected to receive from the federal and state governments, including the federal stimulus money.

Instruction change from \$15,758,217 to \$16,053,721 which is an additional \$295,504.
Transportation change from \$1,894,464 to \$1,968,999 which is an additional \$74,535.
Technology change from \$816,824 to \$1,108,813 which is an additional \$291,989.

Supervisor Chambers moved, Supervisor LeSueur seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to approve the amended FY10 school budget.

Re: Consider seeking bids for Industrial Park Property Timber

Mrs. Carter: Supervisor Chambers was talking to me in the office that we need to start looking at cutting the timber down at the Industrial Park. He said the County should consider hiring a consultant to advise the County of the Market Value in the Park and use that information to solicit bids to harvest the timber.

Supervisor Kitchen: Johnny Bickford did it last time.

Supervisor Chambers: He's on the Planning Commission. It might be a conflict of interest.

Mr. Carter: We have to solicit a consultant to do it. It will probably be under \$10,000 so we don't have to bid it out, but we do have to solicit a quote.

Supervisor Kitchen moved, Supervisor Chambers seconded as was unanimously carried by the Board to consider hiring a consultant to advise the county of the market value of the timber in the industrial park property and that the county use that information to solicit bids to harvest the timber.

Re: Request use of County Property on September 11, 2009 for Walker Bros. Circus

Mrs. Cobb: I was approached by Walker Bros. Circus. They are bases out of Florida and they travel from town to town and put on a circus. They do not have any exotic animals, but they do

have clowns, jugglers, ponies that do tricks and stuff like that and they are interested on coming to Buckingham. So they are interested in some public property and to do their show on September 11, 2009. I spoke with Todd Shumaker, our Rec. Department head and he is very interested in that and thought that we could possibly use Gene Dixon Park for that on September 11th and he has talked with Walker Bros. and asked questions as to whether the fields will be damaged and that sort of thing and after talking with them, he felt comfortable to do this. But we need to put this forward to you all because we do have the festival ordinance which requires a special use permit. If we want it to be on County property, we feel that could be waived, that Walker Bros. could move forward and come to Buckingham.

Mrs. Carter: Industrial Park has to be ruled out because there are no bathroom facilities there unless the public use the bathrooms in the building and Todd said that Gene Dixon Park has the bathroom facilities there. And also with working with them, 10% of the proceeds will go to the new Ballpark Complex.

Supervisor LeSueur moved, Supervisor Chambers seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to use Gene Dixon Park on September 11, 2009 for the Walker Bros. Circus and to waive the special use permit.

Re: County Administration Report000000

Piedmont Regional Disability Services Board:

I want to make you aware; you have a letter from Piedmont Regional Disability Services Board. The County appropriated, I think about \$250 for the next fiscal year, however, they are asking that we suspend their request for funds due to the state did not allocate any money for staff for the Piedmont Regional Disability Services Board until State funding is reinstated or State mandates are put back in place.

Waterworks Plant Inspection Report:

I have provided you with a Waterworks Plant Inspection Report. Mr. W.J. Thompson stated in his letter that "As usual, the waterworks was found to be very clean and well maintained. We are pleased with the attention provided." They have provided you a summary of the comments and recommendations. These things will be addressed with the new water treatment plant.

Organization/Protocol for Operating of the Fire Training Facility

We are very close to having the ribbon cutting ceremony there. We are waiting on the electric to be put in to the doublewide donated by the school system and the building itself. But the county needs to establish a protocol and management plan of that. I have provided you all with a copy of a draft management plan for fire training facilities. The finance committee worked on this along with the County Attorney. We have to establish and incorporate a non profit; this has been provided for you all to look at. The County should not be operating this facility.

Kitchen: I have a question. Who got this fire training facility together?

Mrs. Carter: The Board referred how to pay for it to the finance committee. That should all be in the minutes.

Kitchen: Since it is the board of supervisors' job to appoint committees, Mr. Chairman, I make a motion that—and this is a very good start, and I think it needs a lot of looking at—and I would like to make the motion that we appoint Supervisor Chambers and Supervisor Bill Talbert to the committee to look at this with the fire departments.

Chairman Snoddy asked if Kitchen was talking about appointing a separate committee from the finance committee, Kitchen said yes.

LeSueur: Right now, based on the protocol there is two what I call active fire department members on this board, that Brian Bates and myself. You are not active.

Talbert: I've been on there for 50 years.

LeSueur: That's not what I'm talking about. Are you a longstanding member of the fire department? Are you still an active member?

Talbert: Yes sir. Active as you are.

LeSueur: I'm not going there. Let's not pull how many calls we go on.

Talbert: I'll be 70 years old Thursday, why should I get out here and do that. Why should get out here, I can hold the hose as well as they can, but why should I get out there and do what they do.

LeSueur: This is just a vendetta against Brian and I. That's all it boils down to.

Talbert: No it's not. There's a lot more to this thing.

LeSueur: We've been working on this.

Supervisor Kitchen moved, Supervisor Chambers seconded and was approved with a 5-1 vote to appoint Supervisor Chambers and Talbert to the Fire Training Facilities Committee. Supervisors Kitchen, Allen, Snoddy, Chambers and Talbert voting in favor. Supervisor LeSueur voting in opposition.

Talbert: I'd like to apologize to the Board and to the public. I'd been on the fire department for years as a charter member too. You put that as a non-active member. I apologize, I spoke out of turn.

LeSueur: It's common sense.

2009 Summer Program

I'd like to call your attention to the 2009 Summer Program. I've inserted a copy of the booklet in your board packets. If anyone would like one, they are available at the County Administrator's office.

Re: Other Board Matters

Talbert: I'd like to make a motion for the County Administrator to look into this Workforce Investment Board. I've served on it now for three years. I would like to see if the Board would like to continue. I can't go to the 23rd meeting. If Mrs. Carter would research to see how we stand. I'd just like her to look at it.

Mrs. Carter: I can take care of it.

LeSueur: Mr. Chairman, I have a matter for the board. I'd like for the Board to consider having the Sheriff and the Sheriff's department to gather information from surrounding counties as to the pay for the deputies and bring back to the board to look at it.

Supervisor LeSueur moved, Supervisor Chambers and Talbert seconded and was unanimously carried that the Sheriff and his department gather information regarding salaries in different counties for deputies and bring it back to the Board.

There being no further business to discuss, Chairman Snoddy declared the meeting adjourned.
